

Exploring Greenways

Enjoy all that the Phoenix Greenways has to offer. Whether you are walking, cycling or riding, there is lots to explore.

Easy Access - Well surfaced paths, accessible all year round mean you can get out with prams, pushchairs and wheelchairs to enjoy the trails. When you are ready for a break, visitor centres and cafes with facilities are within easy reach (check map for detail).

Walking - Enjoy walks through a gently rolling patchwork of fields, hedgerows and woodlands. Why not create your own circular routes using OS Explorer maps 269 and 270?

Cycling - Family and leisure cyclists will enjoy travelling well surfaced routes with mostly gentle gradients. Explore the tree lined trails and make the most of refreshments stops at Tversal, Brierley, Pleasley and Hardwick.

Mountain bike tracks - If you fancy something a little more challenging, why not try the mountain bike tracks at Williamthorpe on the Five Pits Trail and Glapwell on the Stockley Trail (see map). They are both blue routes, designed for maximum fun, whether you are a beginner or long in the saddle.

Horse riding - With miles of off road routes and quiet lanes and a specially designed canter track at Tibshelf Ponds, what is stopping you from exploring the Phoenix Greenways? Our horsebox parking scheme offers secure parking (contact us for details 01629 533020).

Fishing - Anglers will find opportunities for a leisurely day by the water at Williamthorpe, Tibshelf, Grassmoor and Hardwick Parks. Day tickets available.

Enjoy safe greenways - please be aware of and considerate to other users on these shared paths. Wear appropriate clothing - see and be seen! Maintenance and agricultural vehicles sometimes use these routes.

Dog walkers, please pick up after your pets - **Bag it and Bin it.**

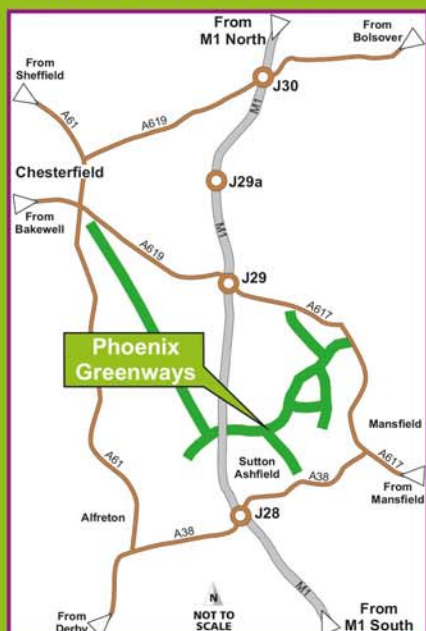

Discover the Phoenix Greenways



Places to Visit

Whether you come for the day, a weekend or a longer stay, there is plenty for the family to do, visit and explore.

You can use the Phoenix Greenways to discover some of Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire's unexplored and stunning landscapes. With a wealth of attractions not far away, there is even more reason to stay longer.

Why not take a look at one of one of the many historic halls and houses? Visit the magnificent Elizabethan Hardwick Hall and Park, see the Discovery Centre in Bolsover Castle and look out for Renishaw Hall, home of the literary Sitwells.

Delve into the Ice Age at Creswell Crags and take a cave tour. From the Crags, you can join the Archaeological Way which links to the Phoenix Greenways.

Explore the Dukeries, the name coming from four historic Ducal Estates - Welbeck, Clumber Park, Thoresby and Worksop Manor (not open to the public) - then take a trip to the Major Oak and discover Robin Hood Country.

Walk a short distance from Chesterfield's iconic Crooked Spire and you'll find an oasis of peace and tranquillity on the Chesterfield Canal. Pop into Tapton Lock Visitor Centre for information about the canal and other places to visit locally.

When you want to take a break from the countryside and culture you could always indulge in a little retail therapy. Stroll through the Shambles in the historic market town of Chesterfield, which still holds markets 4 days a week. Look for bargains at the East Midlands Designer Outfit, just off the M1 at junction 28 or browse the National Trust shop at Clumber Park and Hardwick Hall. Why not visit the Courtyard at Welbeck for great food, great art and great shopping - all within a beautiful rural setting. Galleries, farm shop and café open daily.

Time to eat? You'll find coffee shops serving delicious cakes at all the above attractions and the area is littered with country pubs, so you should never go hungry!

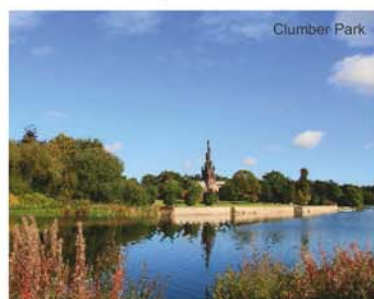
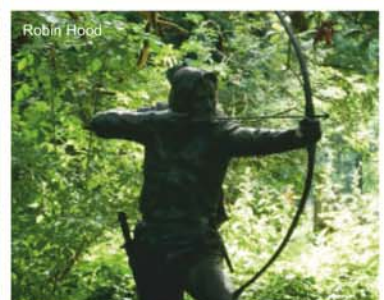

The Phoenix Greenways

The Phoenix Greenways link the Five Pits, Silverhill and Pleasley-Teversal Trails to countryside and popular local attractions. With over 20 miles of easy access off-road routes and quiet lanes there is lots to do and explore. These trails are part of a much wider network, including Chesterfield's Cuckoo Way, the Archaeological Way and the Dukeries Trail and Robin Hood Way in North Nottinghamshire.

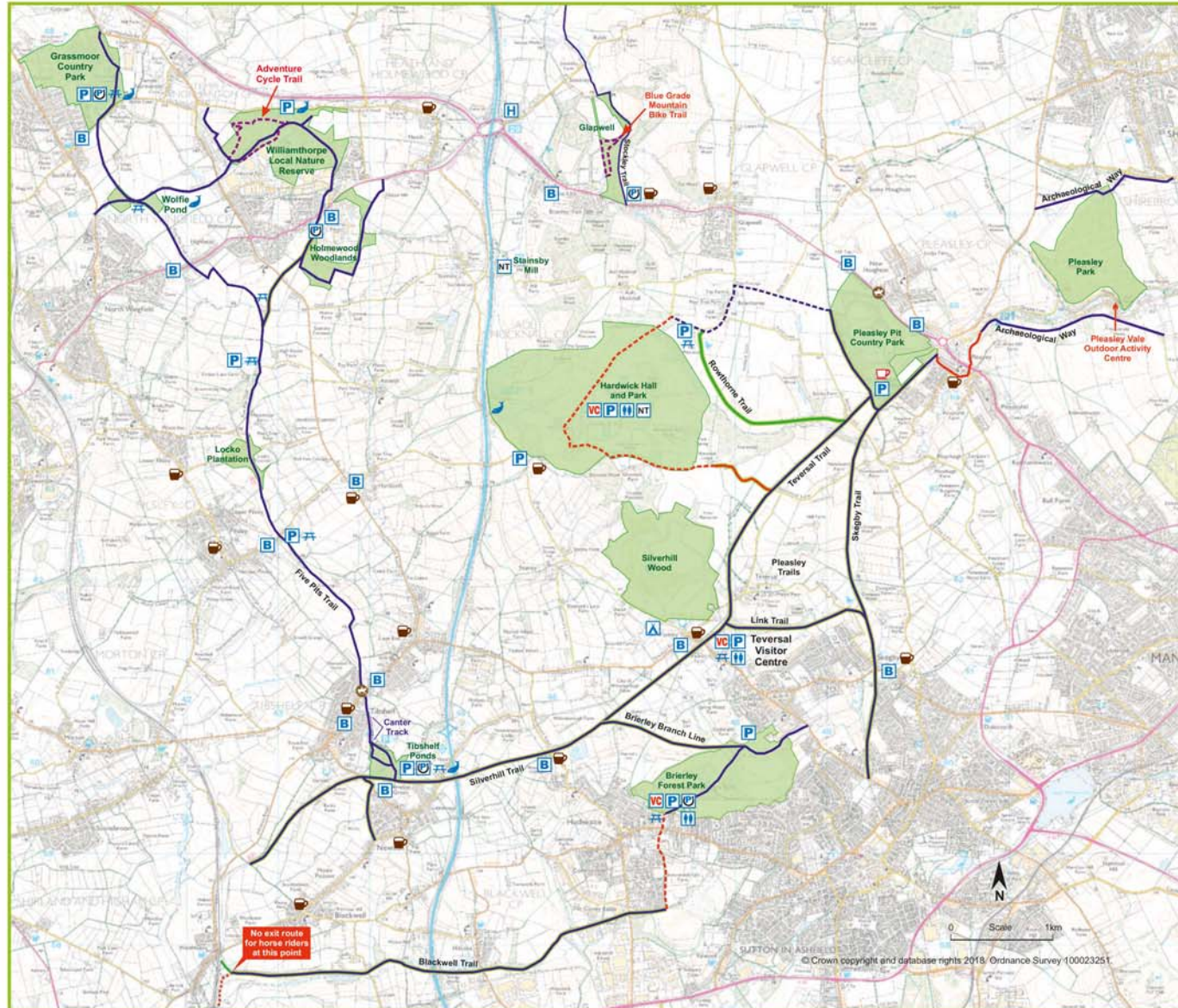
Hardwick Hall and Park
